Speaker for January 12, 2009 Bill Mathis - Gardening with Hardy Terrestrials

Bill became interested in native terrestrial orchids in 1970 as a graduate student at the University of Arkansas . As a part of his masters program, he conducted a series of ecological studies on 'Small Yellow Lady's Slipper' Orchids in Northwest Arkansas . After completing his MS degree in Botany, he moved to the Agronomy Dept and completed a Ph.D. At this point he accepted a job with a major agricultural company and worked as a research scientist and manager for 25 years. He maintained his interest in terrestrial orchids over the years and, in 2000, he set up a lab and started growing a number of species from seed, as well as buying seedlings and mature plants in an effort to accumulate large numbers of 'Showy' upland and wetland terrestrial orchids species.

In 2001, when it became apparent that early retirement was a reality, he started The Wild Orchid Company, focusing on the production and sales of a variety of terrestrial orchids (North American, European and Asian species) that are hardy in Southeastern Pennsylvania . Currently, he is working with hybridization and induced polyploidy of several *Bletilla*, *Cypripedium*, *Calopogon*, *Arethusa* and *Calanthe* species in an effort to select specific plants for horticultural use.

In 2005, he wrote and published a book, The Gardener's Guide to Growing Hardy Perennial Orchids, which is a 'How to' book using a non-technical and practical approach to present the basic requirements for successfully growing hardy perennial orchids.

Bill enjoys giving presentations to local Orchid Societies and Garden Clubs on various aspects of his work with terrestrial orchids. He especially enjoys the excitement of the typical outdoor gardener when they realize that orchids can be grown in their backyard without a greenhouse. He will be bringing books for sale at the meeting.

Minutes of

the Last Meeting 12/08/08

The December TOS meeting was preceded by a Holiday Potluck dinner at 6:30 PM. The meeting room was festively decorated and the food was delicious. Thanks go out to Robin Gurlitz, who organized the event, and her volunteers; Melissa Bullard, Lee Allgood, Janet & Chris Moore, and Michael Arnor, who set up and decorated for the occasion.

President Paul Virtue called the meeting to order at 7:15 PM. The minutes of the November meeting were approved. Miriam Sagasti was recognized and thanked for redesigning and printing new nametags for the membership. John Mayhre announced he had AOS 2009 calendars with him at the meeting for sale at \$10.

President Paul Virtue gave a presentation on the state of the TOS for 2008. 2008 was an active and growing year for the TOS. Membership increased from 143 to 191 members, which makes us one of the top five East Coast orchid societies. Financially we started and finished the year with about \$14,800 in working capital. Activities and accomplishments included: New society brochures designed, printed, and placed with Orchid Trail, Hanks Chapel, and Atlantic Ave. Orchids; Contacting AOS to encourage high level contact with Lowes and Home Depot so we can promote growing orchids and our society events in their stores; Initiated a regional orchid society meeting of presidents to better coordinate activities; Financially successful spring and fall orchid auctions;

Overseas orchid order from Ching Hua – Taiwan; Received Grand Champion award for society's exhibit at the Triad Show; Greenhouse Crawl at Jack Webster's; Growers Day; State Fair exhibit; Holiday Mini-Auction; and preparation for our 2009 orchid show at Northgate Mall. A big "Thank You" goes out to all the volunteers who have made the accomplishments and successes of the Triangle Orchid Society possible.

The Show Table was presented by Paul Feaver. Non-Greenhouse category: 1st Place – Masdevallia Jerry Sedecklo by Lee Allgood, 2nd Place – Lc Summit View 'Prime' by Lee Allgood, and 3rd Place – Paph venustum album 'Green Flash' by Lee Allgood.

In the Greenhouse grown category, 1st Place – Bulbophyllum? by Rick Cavallaro, 2nd Place – Cymbidium Milton Carpenter by Bob Meyer, and 3rd Place – Lc. Phra Nakhon Khiri x C. Netrasiri Beauty 'Rainbow' by Olivene Virtue.

Instead of a speaker, a Holiday Mini-Auction was held consisting primarily of orchids from Jack Webster's estate and Hoosier Orchids. 60 plants were auctioned, raising slightly more than \$1700. Thank you to Phil Warner and Bob Meyer for auctioneering, Heather Schneider for organizing and printing the auction list, Paul Virtue for his computerized illustration of the sale plants, and Robin & Josh Gurlitz for recording the successful bids and handling the financial aspects of the auction.

The meeting ended at the conclusion of the auction, around 9:15 PM.







Growing Tips for January

Days are finally getting longer now that we have reached the winter solstice. Many orchids use a lengthening day as a cue to begin the flowering process. Greenhouse growers can sit back and let Nature do its thing, but those growing indoors need to provide an increase in day length in the next month to initiate spring flowering.

While we typically think that winter is a difficult time for our orchids, remember that many tropical orchids come from relatively high elevations and so the cooler nights and days are ideal for them. Miltoniopsis, Lycastes, Odontoglossums, Phragmipediums, and numerous other genera that suffered from the heat for much of the year now thrive. Some orchid growers include cool growing orchids in their collections and provide lots of shading or even air conditioning in summer to provide cooler temperatures. Even many orchids that do well in summer thrive when the stress of high temperatures is relieved.

Cool days and even cooler nights slow down plant metabolism (activities in the plant that use energy). When light is hitting orchid leaves the temperature inside the orchid leaf is much higher and the plant can regulate that temperature to maximize photosynthesis even in cooler conditions. At night, however, cooler temperatures also slow down an orchid's metabolism allowing your orchid to retain and store more of the energy it captured during photosynthesis. If you have a cattleya that grows new pseudobulbs in winter and summer, winters bulbs are usually thicker as a result.

Unfortunately, orchids from very warm, tropical environments, such as phalaenopsis

and vandas, may almost cease growth if temperatures remain below 60 F for long periods. Remember that there are exceptions to every rule and hobbyists that have added species to their collections need to consult the orchid literature to determine the natural conditions for a species and do their best to maintain those conditions. While most phals like it warm, >65 F, some of the miniature species and their hybrids, e.g. *Phal parishii* and *lobbii* do better with cooler nights.

Cymbidiums are a group that suffers during hot summers, but grow extremely well in winter. They will even thrive outside in the southern part of the country, as long as they are not allowed to freeze. Once spikes are observed, however, move them inside or somewhere where they can be maintained above 50 F to avoid damage to sensitive buds.

Most cattleyas need to be kept on the dry side now. It is OK if there is some shriveling of the bulbs, but the leaves should not shrivel too. A dry period is especially important for cattleya species to ensure quality blooms and to maintain a healthy root system. One common mistake is to substitute misting for watering. Misting can help maintain higher humidity in winter, when low humidity can be a problem, but plants still need a thorough soaking just less frequently. If you do mist, use deionized or distilled water to prevent salt buildup on leaves.

Phalaenopsis and most of the popular intergeneric oncidiums are in bloom this time of year and require more moisture than cattleyas. They too, are growing more slowly and care is required to prevent rotting roots.


