


Jan 13 at 7.30 pm TOS Monthly Meeting at JCRA

Jason Harpster will speak on the topic of Understanding Angraecoids.

Jason, a TOS member, has been growing orchids for over 15 years. He is a published author, accredited AOS judge and as of Jan 2025, he will be chairperson of the AOS Carolinas Judging Center, taking over from TOS member Sarah Patterson. Jason's collection includes approximately 1,200 orchids with more than 500 species representing 100+ genera. Jason will be selling orchids during the meeting.

If you are not familiar with this fabulous subtribe of orchids, I encourage you to come listen to Jason. And, of course you are most welcome to join us for dinner at the Neomonde Mediterranean Restaurant on the Beryl Rd one hour before the meeting and be part of the pre-meeting orchid banter.





If you like the weird and wonderful, I think you'll enjoy *Bulbophyllum purpureorhachis* (two photos below)

This unusual species, a specimen in a boarder's collection at Riverwood Orchids Farm, is native to the lowland forests of Liberia, plus the countries of western central Africa (Congo, Cameroon, Gabon, Ivory Coast and Zaire). It has numerous small flowers arranged on a tall, twisted and flattened inflorescence.

Be warned, it does have a spreading

growth habit because of relatively long internodes between its pseudobulbs on the root rhizome. Therefore, it quickly outgrows the growing containers used for repotting. The flowers are faintly stinky too.



To the right and below is a delightful little hybrid of *Phalaenopsis equestris* growing in my own greenhouse. Its label - *Phal. equestris* 'Ilocus' x 'Roman Holiday' Fantasy - is still a bit of a mystery. If any member recognizes the writing on this label, I would love to hear from you because I do not recall where I got this orchid from, though it was probably a TOS auction.

Last year I repotted it into Orchiata bark, but in an open basket rather than a pot and it is seems to be responding very well.
