Business-related Matters from Mar 18 TOS Board Meeting

- 1. Checking account balance as of 3/17/24: \$8,371
- 2. TOS' proposed 2024 budget of \$20,000 was accepted by way of a motion with the caveat that budgetary adjustments may be necessary as the year progresses.
- 3. The Board has approved obtaining a second website domain for TOS which will allow our administrators to redesign and test a new, updated website without taking the current TOS website out of commission for any extended period. Approved cost for this project approx. \$100-150.
- 4. A wonderful, unanticipated raffle amount of \$240 was raised at the Mar 11 monthly TOS meeting, thanks to the very generous donations of Steve Taras, owner of Watered Garden Florist (see below).

In Reflection: Mar 11 TOS meeting at JCRA

Wow, what a meeting! Steve Taras, owner of Watered Garden Florist, and his colleague Ron Reeves, demonstrated the artistry of designing and making floral displays using some truly eye-popping cut orchid blooms! A few of us let out audible gasps of disbelief as he sliced through stems of majestic cymbidium blooms to appropriately size and shape them for a display. His creations were breathtaking, and all were generously donated along with many spare cut flowers. What started out as a modest raffle of several phalaenopsis orchids quickly turned into a mega-raffle of fantastic table arrangements and bunches of cut flowers.













Steve shared several practical tips and tricks in the use of items such as OASIS® foam, floral tape, frogs (not the live ones!), floral putty, and pebbles as helpful aids to flower arranging. And, demonstrated how a simple piece of contorted hazel branch (without leaves) when added in a vase of flowers at the end can really create movement and flair. Furthermore, Steve introduced us (at least me anyway) to the primary orchid hybrid *Aranthera* James Storie (left photo). One or two branching inflorescences of this orchid with their deep raspberry-colored flowers turns a vase of flowers into something stunning. Even when arranged on its own in a carefully chosen vase this orchid creates an exceptional center table decoration – it's a Ron Reeves' favorite for obvious reason.

All in all, it was a splendid meeting, a real lively lesson of how to turn cut flowers into spectacular floral arrangements. I believe all TOS members present were impressed because they certainly heeded the call to buy raffle tickets to support our show in the Fall, and some were rewarded most handsomely for chancing a few dollars. ->->->

At the end, the room scene resembled something of the chaotic close of an early morning wholesale flower market with folks scrambling to clean up whilst others gathered the remaining unused flowers into bunches! Everyone who wanted flowers got to go home with some, which was magical. **THANK YOU** to all TOS Members present for your very generous support!

Upcoming: Apr 8 TOS meeting at JCRA



Calling all Habenaria Gowers

Your Habs, which overwintered as tubers in near dry conditions, should have broken dormancy by now. But, do not be over eager with the water and fertilizer just yet. When is the right time to be doing things with Habs? Our TOS Member, John Barnes, contacted Sarah Hurdel, a Hab specialist and past speaker, for advice and she shared the following very helpful graphics (now provided to you with permission from Something About Orchids).





I aim to pot between these two stages to reduce risk of under/over watering





2 weeks ago

This tuber is potted and growing - but expect reduced flowering

Something About Orchids

Temp-Warm Light-Medium

Early Season Habenaria Care

Root growth begins

Mist surface when dry

Water lightly



Use surface drying as indicator: Mist to maintain humidity in pot. Goal - avoid soaking media, or drying out.

Evenly moist

TIP -

Beginners or low humidity areas: Place potted tuber in sealed baggie until root growth begins.
