



Phyllis Erikson of Ironwood Estate Orchids gave a presentation on Growing Cattleya Orchids. It was clear, concise, and covered all the key points of growing and flowering cattleyas, and it was just the right length with informative slides. A selection of super plants was available at very affordable prices. They not only included some great cattleya species and hybrids, but also some very collectible plants from other orchid genera. Even though I'm totally out of greenhouse space I caved upon discovering a few of the all-time classic catts upon the sales benches, one being C. Bob Betts, a famous heirloom cattleya

hybrid made and registered by Clint McDade several decades ago. I have not tested it for virus.....yet! (viruses are somewhat common in heirloom catts.)

Members' Feature



A Bulbo species and a hybrid

A beautiful specimen of *Bulbophyllum rothschildianum* owned by member Sara Gallis, flowering at her Riverwood Orchids Farm. This species was first described in 1912 and is native to SW China, NE India, and N Myanmar. It has a bit of a whiffy "fragrance," but is undoubtedly very pleasant if you happen to be a fly!



Bulbophyllum annandalei '9 Flrs' CTD* x Bulb. frostii 'Red Tag' flowering in my greenhouse.

Bulb. annandalei grows a little more east in Thailand and Malaysia compared to Bulb. rothschildianum above; Bulb. frostii is native even further east in Vietnam.

*Seed parent (*Bulb. annandalei*) of this cross was treated with the chemical colchicine to double its chromosomes.



Dendrobium affine 'Raleigh's First' HCC/AOS. A smaller dendrobium species grown very nicely on a cork bark mount, owned by TOS life-member Harry Gallis, MD, who named it for the fact that it was the first orchid ever awarded in 1995 at the AOS supplemental Raleigh Judging Center (unfortunately, the RJC did not become a fullfledged judging center for this region as it did not get the support it deserved when push came to shove).

In my book, the rich plum-colored basal half of the lip, together with

the touch of diffusing plum color at the base of the pure white petals and sepals, make this a truly striking flower!



This is *Cattleya* Mary Lynn McKenzie - a little teaser for the those heading up to Art Chadwick's Greenhouses next month. It's currently flowering at Riverwood Orchids Farm and is another Harry Gallis plant.

Harry informed me that it was ginormous so I swung by to check it out. The actual flower dimensions inches were horizontally by 81/2 inches vertically. And, its fragrance was exquisite – no fly pollinators for this beauty!

The genome of this hybrid comprises all the usual suspects

of a classic white catt: C. mossiae (50%); C. trianae (25%); C. gaskelliana (18.75%); C. warneri (6.25%).

The purple petals and sepals with the velvety-look of the burgundy lip make this flower unquestionably very beautiful; the petals recurve slightly, which apparently would result in the loss of a few points if it were sent for AOS judging. Nonetheless I'm sure you'll agree, the flower is loaded with orchid "wow factor!"

This cross is genetically complex, containing 21 different species with significant doses of *C. dowiana*, *C. trianae* and *C. warscewiczii* DNA from the seed parent, as well as a heavy dose of *C. coccinea* DNA from the pollen parent.



Whatever your days may bring in the coming month - be it work or play - make the time to take a short walk along a river, creek, or woodland trail, or visit a garden (JCRA!) to exercise, relax and "smell the roses" of life for it's a fabulous time of year.

If you have the conditions for growing draculas (lucky you!) then I hope they are putting on a spooky Halloween display for you!
